A Message from the CEO

There has been a great deal to celebrate in our Central Puget Sound Council this past month!

First, our Candy Sale this year was an exceptional success. Our sellers really demonstrated their finely honed sales skills, with an average of 129 units sold. We extend our sincere thanks to the fantastic volunteers who give so much time and effort to the candy sale process, from rally to wrap up! I joined my daughter and her friend selling candy in our West Seattle community at QFC and at the REI Seattle store during their annual winter sale. It's hard to say what I enjoyed most, but two things stand out. I certainly appreciated witnessing these 10-year-old girls in action as they supported each other to keep their spirits up when sales dragged in the cold and rain. And I treasured the many encounters with Camp Fire girls from my era who went out of their way to say hello and buy mints or P-Nuttles or Camper Mix from this generation of Camp Fire kids. The warmth of Camp Fire experiences in youth surely stays with us for life!

Second, we reached an agreement with King County to preserve forever 100 acres of coastal and environmentally sensitive land at Camp Sealth. Through the county's Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) program, this agreement will ensure that this valuable land is protected forever. It also provides Camp Fire with nearly \$1,000,000 that can be used to ensure the future health and continued operations of Camp Sealth and other year-round Camp Fire programs that benefit youth throughout the Puget Sound region.

A moment like this is an opportunity to look back and honor the courage and spirit of Ruth Brown and Ellen Bringloe who founded Camp Sealth in 1920. They rallied support from the Kiwanis Club, The Seattle Times, The Mountaineers and other community partners to help secure the funding for the original purchase of our Vashon Island property in 1921.

This TDR agreement ensures Camp Sealth's unspoiled natural beauty, fish spawning habitat, majestic forests, and beautiful Puget Sound beach – the same awe-inspiring splendors that attracted Ruth and Ellen nearly a century ago – will be protected in perpetuity. Boys and girls will continue to attend Camp Sealth to have fun and learn about and appreciate themselves, others, and the natural world for generations to come.

What's a typical day in Lead Up?

- **We'll pick you up:** Camp Fire staff will provide transportation each day, including pick-ups between 8:30 – 9:15 a.m. at several convenient locations (we'll make arrangements for stops near where you live or where your parents/guardians work).
- **Lead Up Kick-off:** After pick-up, you will join your Team Leader and Lead Up team and get ready to have fun. We'll do some teambuilding games, talk about the plan for the day, enjoy a snack, and then head out for our group adventure.
- **Let the Discovery Begin:** Each day we will explore Seattle and beyond with field trips, service and leadership opportunities, each planned around a unique theme.
- **Lunch:** Participants should bring a healthy lunch each day that does not need to be heated or refrigerated. Bring a water bottle. Snacks will be provided.
- **Wrap up:** At the end of each day, we'll regroup, have a snack, and reflect on our experiences that day.
- **Drop Off:** We will drop you off at your location between 4 – 4:30 p.m.

I still don't get it...what kinds of activities will youth be doing? Each 5-day session is planned around an exciting theme such as *Top Chef*, *Water Warriors*, *Road Rules*, *Law & Order*. Teams will check out Seattle culture, explore different foods, address community issues, check out college and career paths, work on team challenges, do adventurous activities like going rock climbing or to Wild Waves, go behind-the-scenes at hotels, restaurants, television and radio shows, hang out with friends and see and do some of the best things the Puget Sound area has to offer!

Hands Across the Border Celebration

Sunday, June 12, 2011

This year marks the 88th year of the Peace Arch celebration. Youth participants parade through the arch, often led by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Washington State Police. Come join in an exciting day of international friendship and fun, be part of this historical celebration of peace. Make plans with your group and encourage your families to gather and come early. Participants range between 13,000 to 20,000 youth.

Registration: Register your group upon arrival at the Canadian and the US Kitchen to receive flags and programs.

Event Schedule: It runs from 10 a.m.–3:30 p.m. I-5 & Highway 99 are closed between noon and 4 p.m.

Parade starts: 1 p.m.

Suggestions: Arrive early, limited parking. Parade marshalling begins at noon. Be prepared for the weather. Dress in layers. It can be very hot or very rainy. Many participants bring their own picnic lunches. It is recommended that Group Leaders carry photo ID.

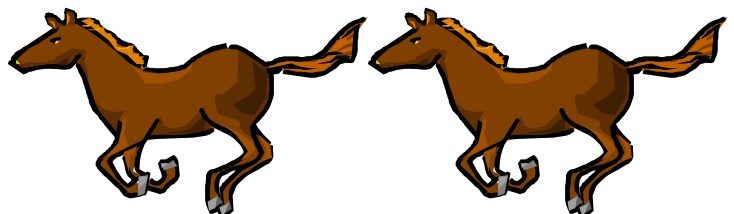

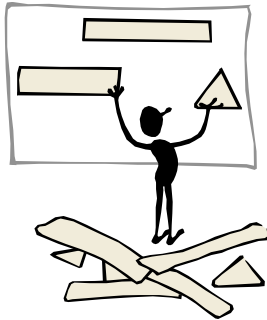


Annual Auction Revisited

Please note that Camp Fire USA's Board of Directors has decided that we will not be holding our auction this year.

We know how much fun the auctions have been in the past, and we deeply appreciate the generosity of our sponsors, donors, guests and volunteers. We want to ensure that our fundraising efforts are successful from perspectives of both participant experience and resources raised for Camp Fire. In light of the tremendous level of effort required for a successful auction, the reality of continued lower levels of corporate giving for sponsorships, as well as the sheer number of auctions creating a sense of "auction fatigue" among potential guests, the Board of Directors held a vote and formalized the decision to cancel this year's auction.

The board and staff are working together to plan other fun events and approaches to raise needed funds to support children and families served through Camp Fire programs. We are considering moving to an "every other year" cycle for a gala auction. We want to thank everyone who has supported the auction in the past – we couldn't do it without all the volunteers and donations that come in from our alumni and program participants. Join the Childhood Obesity Prevention Coalition in a community-wide challenge to take a break from soda and other sugary drinks for at least one day each week for six weeks.



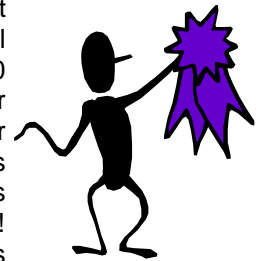
Why Soda Free? And Why Sunday?

We know that sugary drinks are one of the major contributors to obesity today, particularly among kids. But we also know that cutting back on overconsumption of these drinks is *tough*. Every day we are bombarded by highly effective advertisements, constantly faced with the lure of inexpensive and easily accessible sugary beverages. Soda Free Sundays recognizes that, together as a community, we can take a first step towards building a healthier generation.

Oh, and while you might choose to go Soda Free on other days of the week, we picked Sunday because it is a day for gathering among families and friends who can support each other in going Soda Free, and well...because it's also kind of catchy!

Candy Fundraiser Breaks Record

They said it couldn't be done! But **YOU** did it! No Camp Fire Council has ever averaged more than 110 units per seller (that was our average in 2010). This year our average was 129! The sale was 25 days long. The average sales per day were 2,506 units of candy!



YOUR HARD WORK made this happen! **Thanks to all the sellers, their families, 87 Candy Captains, 21 Candy Distributors, 17 Site Sale Coordinators and 7 Coordinators!** It indeed takes a village to earn the money to keep Camp Fire alive and well!

The candy fundraiser earns money for Camp Fire programs, groups and individuals. \$21,794 in refunds was earned by groups to buy beads and emblems, attend spring events, and purchase supplies! Individuals earned \$10,153 in currency to use for Camp Fire programs and events!

Operation Homefront is excited to be receiving 2,706 units of candy to give to families who have a deployed parent and to wounded service personnel.

In addition to the money earned, person after person has shared stories of hearing from alumni while selling and using the store selling hours to build a tighter bond between parent and child. Thanks again for your time, energy, commitment, and support of Camp Fire programs. I feel honored to work with you in building caring, confident youth and future leaders!

I know that the economy has been really hard on...everyone, but think for a minute, can you imagine not having anything to wear? I read about "Dress a Girl Around the World" and the work they do. They have chosen to make simple little cotton dresses for girls out of clean, new pillowcases that are delivered to poor areas of the United States and underprivileged countries all over the world. It does not matter if you sew a lot or a little, anyone could make this garment.

Camp Fire Level Awards

Adventure — earn a bead

Discovery — use this as part of the Style Torchbearer or S.T.A.R. Award

Horizon — use this project as part of a Reflection

Everyone earns a special ribbon for participating (courtesy of STAATS)

I hope that you will create a dress to donate to "Dress a Girl Around the World." I'd love to make 100 little cotton dresses in honor of the 100th anniversary of Camp Fire USA. Wouldn't that be cool?

Materials you need:

1 cotton pillowcase, or

1 1/8 yd. cotton fabric (to make a dress with a 1" rolled hem), or

1 yd + 1/4 cotton fabric contrast (to make a dress with a contrast hem like a pillowcase)

2 – 7" pieces of 1/4 or 1/2" wide elastic

2 – 32-36" lengths of double-fold bias tape (color to blend or contrast with fabric)

Scrap pieces of lace, rick-rack, braid, buttons, appliques, and/or contrast pieces of fabric—anything you think would make the dress cute and fun!!

Equipment needed:

Sewing machine, pins, sewing shears, pencil, ruler, iron, thread & safety pin.

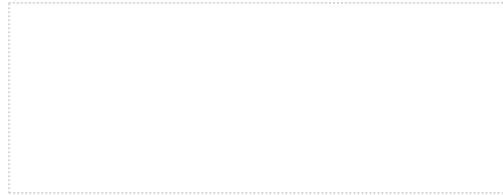
